Fatima's story



Fatima was found after hut-to-hut searches for Noma victims were conducted. She has been living with this awful disfigurement since early childhood. After careful negotiations with local chiefs, Fatima was brought to Addis Ababa for facial reconstructive surgery.



Fatima had never left her village before her visit to Addis Ababa for treatment. She was daunted by the technical equipment she encountered. To put her mind at ease, the international team of surgeons explained the reconstructive procedure before commencing the difficult operation.



Following her successful operation, Fatima is now looking forward to receiving a photographic identity card she can be proud of.

What is Noma?

Noma is an ancient disease. It takes its name from a Greek word meaning 'to devour'.

Noma is no longer seen in the developed world but still exists elsewhere, including Ethiopia.

The World Health Organisation estimates that 100,000 – 150,000 children aged 2-6 contract Noma each year. 90% of Noma victims do not survive.

Those who do survive face severe physical difficulties. They are also ostracised by their communities, often finding themselves excluded and mocked by those they love and need the most.

The need for funding more operations like Fatima's is as great as ever. It costs approximately £800 to treat each patient.

The costs include:

- Travel expenses, basic meals and accommodation for the medical professionals
- Costs to locate the Noma victims and transport them from remote villages to Addis Ababa
- · Basic accommodation and meals for patients for the duration of their stay
- Surgical equipment, dressings and medication
- Local medical staff overtime
